This story and the many others you'll read throughout *Faces of Faith* are important reminders of why WELS devotes itself to reaching the lost through home missions. WELS Home Missions currently supports 130 congregations with financial subsidy or district mission board/mission counselor assistance in 35 states, Canada, and English-speaking West Indies. Home Missions also supports more than 32 campus ministries.

Through Home Missions, WELS members have more opportunities to rescue souls from the fires of hell—directing them to salvation through faith in Jesus Christ. Home Missions has a wonderful

responsibility from our church body to start and support missions so more "Rachels" can joyfully confess faith in the Savior, Jesus Christ.



HOME MISSIONS

Every spring, the Board for Home Missions (BHM) and the BHM Executive Committee prioritize requests for new missions and ministry enhancements. In 2018, 23 requests were received. On April 13, 2018, the BHM approved support for seven new mission congregations as well as support to enhance mission-minded ministry at seven other congregations.

2018 HOME MISSIONS NEW STARTS

- **Reno, Nev.** Two area congregations are partnering to start this congregation in the Northern Valleys area of greater Reno. On March 25, 2018, the first worship service was held; 63 people attended.
- **Phoenix, Ariz.**—Crosswalk, Phoenix, is opening a second site to reach out into downtown Phoenix.
- Joplin, Mo.—A strong core of WELS and Evangelical Lutheran Synod members from the two nearest churches are helping support this mission.
- Brandon, S.D.—Near Sioux Falls, this new congregation includes core members from two WELS churches and an Evangelical Lutheran Synod congregation.
- Milwaukee, Wis.—Grace in downtown Milwaukee, one of WELS' original congregations, is establishing a new location in the area known as the Third Ward.

2018 HOME MISSIONS NEW STARTS—UNSUBSIDIZED

- Hobart, Wis.—Mount Olive, Suamico, Wis., is starting a second site in Hobart. The congregation is calling a second pastor to begin this new ministry.
- Horicon, Wis.—Members of St. John's, Juneau, Wis., see an opportunity to reach out in nearby Horicon, where 90 members of St. John's live. Saturday worship services began in Horicon in June 2018.

Faces of Faith - Jeffry

I met Jeffry during my second week of ministry. The millennial man quietly sat on the end of his friend's couch during my first ever visit to a member's home. He never believed in God and had a strong aversion to "religious talk." Somehow, he started checking out a few worship services. Then he started checking out a midweek Bible study. While his worship and Bible study attendance waxed and waned throughout the year, he never completely fell off the radar. Then, in late 2017, Jeffry said, "Pastor, I want to get baptized."

We poured over the Catechism, soaking in every beautiful verse that mentions "washing" or "renewal" or "rebirth" or "baptism." At the end of one of our grueling sessions, his usually calm demeanor changed in a flash and he blurted, "Wow, I really need to get baptized!" On January 21, 2018, God officially made Jeffry a part of his family.



It's for moments like those that pastors and Christian men and women work long hours. Rejection is always personal. Skeptical looks are always hurtful. Sunday statistical progress is often untraceable. But Jeffry is living proof that God works through everyday, gospel-bearing persistence.

WELS has more than 550 campus ministries across the United States and Canada. WELS Church Extension Fund (CEF) provides loans to mission churches to purchase land and help build worship facilities. CEF grant programs are also a blessing to home missions. Since 1993, more than \$33 million has been granted to mission congregations. Thanks to CEF assistance, 12 home missions have dedicated worship facilities in 2017 and 2018.

2018 HOME MISSIONS ENHANCEMENTS

- **Crown of Life, Corona, Calif.**—This multi-site mission currently has four different locations for worship. Home Missions funding will support a third pastor.
- Faith, Anchorage, Alaska—A second bilingual pastor will allow Faith to enhance its Hispanic ministry.
- Grace, Seattle, Wash.—Two congregations will be combining to restart their ministry in the heart of Seattle. Funding will allow a full-time pastor to again serve at Grace.
- Ascension, Harrisburg, Penn.—Remaining members of Ascension are ready to restart their congregation. They have demonstrated they are willing to take on ministry responsibilities and support outreach efforts that will be guided by their next pastor.
- Shepherd of the Hills, Knoxville, Tenn.—A group of members are ready to restart their congregation after a longer-term pastoral vacancy. With the congregation back on its feet, they hope to begin a preschool ministry to jump start their outreach efforts.
- **Trinity, Waukesha, Wis.**—Trinity hopes to reach out to a large population of Hispanics in their community by bringing in a bilingual pastor to lead the ministry.
- Epiphany and First, Racine, Wis.—These two Racine congregations currently operate a joint Lutheran elementary school. Home Missions funding will allow the school to call a staff minister or teacher to coordinate outreach efforts to unchurched families.

Faces of Faith - Avery + Haileigh

"Last week I thought Christianity was just about living a certain way, but now I know it's about Jesus forgiving my sins."

So said Avery (pictured left) on the Wednesday after she attended a church (our church) for the first time in her life. Except for the gospel itself, this pastor's ears have perhaps never heard sweeter words.

Haileigh (pictured right), Avery's friend and fellow junior at Fenton High School, had helped with our soccer camp three weeks earlier. She had come to our church for the first time the very next day, and then brought Avery a couple weeks later. Even though they are the only ones from their respective families who are currently interested in learning more about Jesus, fast forward seven months from that Wednesday: Avery and Haileigh are getting confirmed and Avery is being baptized!

God did it again—he raised a soul from death to life!

Carter has now graduated and has taken a job in the small Wyoming community of Buffalo, about four hours north of Laramie. We don't have a church in Buffalo, so Carter and his fiancé Emily (pictured below) are helping us get our second site off the ground. Currently they worship with us each week via our worship livestream on Facebook. It's our hope that sometime in 2018 the Lord will bless us with a facility in Buffalo where Carter and Emily can begin to invite friends to join them!

Faces of Faith-Seng

At the age of four, my parents (who are shamans) enrolled my siblings and me into Sunday school to keep us occupied. Even though I didn't speak or understand English, being at church made me happy. As I walked into class,

I was afraid because I didn't know anyone. I observed and nodded yes to everything. At the end of class, I remember praying for the first time. I didn't understand what to do so my Sunday school teacher held my hands, gently placing them together. brushed her hand down my face to close my eyes, and began to talk. When she talked, I felt at peace. My body was

calm, and I felt safe.

Later that day, I asked my sister if her class did the same. She told me, "Yes, it's called praying. We pray when we want to talk to God. When we're happy, mad, sad, or just want to talk." A few months later, my family left the church. Even though I didn't fully understand who God was or what my class taught me, I understood how to pray and continued to throughout my life. Through prayers, God was there at my happiest moments and through my hardest life challenges. Through him I survived an abusive marriage, divorce, custody battle for my two girls, and getting laid off work.

After I was laid off, I accepted a job at a school where I met my current pastor's wife and her brother who were part of the evangelism team at Immanuel Hmong Lutheran Church in St. Paul, Minn. As they both encouraged me to continue to seek God and for my small family to visit the congregation, my daughters and I became members in August of 2016. After Pastor Pheng Moua baptized me, I prayed to God, "Even after 26 years you have not forsaken me."

JOINT MISSIONS

WELS Joint Missions oversees any mission opportunity that is a combination of both Home and World Missions. This includes people-group ministries (connecting people with the same language and culture) and cross-cultural ministries (outreach from one culture to another).

Joint Missions recognizes that the world is continually shrinking, and our synod's ability to reach even more people-groups seems neverending. We are committed to connecting our resources to reach all peoples both stateside and abroad. One of the top priorities of Joint Missions is to strengthen the partnership with Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary in support of the Pastoral Studies Institute (PSI), while continuing to focus on current ministry to Hmong, Hispanic, South Asian, Sudanese, and Vietnamese cultures.

- Joint Mission's goal is to establish 15 healthy people-group ministries and identify 15 new people-group ministry opportunities by 2020.
- Hmong theological training in Vietnam through the Global Hmong Committee has borne fruit—

the Hmong Fellowship Church in Vietnam has grown from 65,000 to 100,000 members in the past 3 years.

- The communist government in Vietnam has invited WELS to build a **theological training facility** in Hanoi. WELS is currently the only Protestant church with official governmental permission to work with the Hmong in Vietnam.
- Twenty WELS congregations currently hold worship in Spanish and English.
- Christ Lutheran Church in Pewaukee, Wis., will be the location of an International Friendship Center (IFC) pilot program to reach out to South Asian populations.
- Joint Missions is working closely with **Friends** of Vietnam, a ministry out of Peace in Jesus Lutheran Church in Boise, Idaho, that reaches out by supplying English as a Foreign Language (EFL) teachers to universities in Vietnam and assisting students who desire to come to the United States to study at WELS schools.

Faces of Faith - Thomas

I was in the middle of a Bible basics class when a Sudanese man politely interrupted, "May I join you?" Thomas had been an evangelist in South Sudan for three years before the civil war that erupted in December 2013 forced him to return to Canada, where he is a citizen. A Sudanese friend who had recently joined our congregation had told him, "St. Paul is a good church. They have a good pastor. They teach good doctrine. You should come."

Four years later, Thomas has brought three other Sudanese families to our congregation and has invited many more. A recent Sudanese visitor told me, "Thomas has been inviting me for months. I finally came today." His invitation is the same one Thomas received, "St. Paul is a good church. They have a good pastor. They teach good doctrine. You should come."



But like most Sudanese, Thomas has a strong desire to share the Lutheran teaching he has learned with his people in refugee camps in Ethiopia and Kenya. Last year, he traveled to Gambella, Ethiopia, to provide hygiene training and share a gospel pamphlet in the Nuer language entitled, *Do you really have Jesus?* This spring that same group is returning with a Nuer catechism to distribute. Thomas is now a "good" Pastoral Studies Institute (PSI) student, who hopes to one day become a "good" pastor, sharing the "good" doctrine among the Sudanese—both at home and abroad.

PASTORAL STUDIES INSTITUTE



The Pastoral Studies Institute (PSI) of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, in partnership with WELS Joint Missions, guides and assists non-traditional students through their pre-seminary and seminary training, providing a flexible path to ministry.

The PSI has connected with students through congregational ministry to immigrants and refugees here in the United States and Canada, as well as through WELS world mission work. The PSI is able to evaluate and serve these groups that want support, training, and a connection to a church body that shares the gospel message in its truth and purity.

Through the PSI, Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary professors teach and consult on curriculum at seminaries and Bible institutes around the world that are in fellowship with WELS. Each year the PSI team serves well over 100 students.

Faces of Faith-Matthew

In July 2015, while in search of a place to worship with my congregation, I met Pastor Klatt of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in New Hope, Minn. After reaching doctrinal agreement, my congregation which consists primarily of African immigrants began worshiping in Holy Trinity's sanctuary. Pastor Klatt encouraged me to check out the Pastoral Studies Institute (PSI) program. What a blessing that turned out to be.

In addition to the congregation I serve here in the U.S., God has privileged me to supervise 27 churches in Liberia, West Africa. Members of my congregation and I travel there twice every year for leadership/ pastoral training and an annual church conference. Our last church leadership training seminar was attended by 86 congregational leaders, and over 500 laypeople and leaders attended the general conference held in December 2017. I am thankful for the Lord's timing as he brought me into contact with Pastor Klatt and the PSI just as the door opened for me to strengthen my connections with these congregations.

Thanks to the various PSI courses I have completed so far, my level of insight has increased. I have a clearer understanding of Christian doctrine from the Word of God. My preaching and teaching styles have changed because I now look at the context of the Scriptures and let the Bible speak for itself rather than basing my words on human reasoning and traditions. Through the PSI courses I learned about the "three alones": grace alone, faith alone, and Scripture alone.

WORLD MISSIONS

ONE LATIN AMERICA

The One Latin America (1LA) mission team exists to train any Spanish speaker, no matter where they might be located, on how to read God's Word and share it with others. The 1LA team casts a wide net on the Internet and through social media, with a focus on those who would like to learn how to start small Bible study groups, which, in turn, plants more congregations. Imagine a never-ending chain of people telling each other about Jesus. The team is excited about upcoming opportunities in multiple new nations, including Paraguay and Ecuador, and having a base of operations in Miami, Fla.

Faces of Faith-David

David Theys was a Lutheran without a church. Living in the colonial city of Salta in far northwestern Argentina, the bookstore owner gathered his family around the Word of God, but he was looking to gather together with others. From a friend of a friend he heard about the work that the 1LA team was doing online. He was interested and signed up for a class... and then another class. After demonstrating a deep commitment to biblical teaching and a strong desire to share the

gospel with others, David was visited by Missionary Phil Strackbein and his wife. They spent days at David's house discussing what the Bible says. After those conversations, David expressed his desire to become a confirmed, confessional Lutheran and his desire to share the Word with others. In the coming year, David will begin to gather people around the Word of God in Salta while using Academia Cristo materials and communicating with the 1LA mission team. Pray for the effort in Salta, Argentina.

- Members of the 1LA team and other trained men in our fellowship offer live, online Bible classes in a program called **Academia Cristo**.
- The Academia Cristo Facebook page recently surpassed 1 million followers.
- Individuals from every country in Latin America have taken live classes with the 1LA team.
- The waiting list for Academia Cristo online classes has over **1,000 names** on it.
- The 1LA team conducts in-person visits with those in online classes who are interested in on-theground work, value God's Word in its truth and purity, and show gifts to start such work.
- Two 1LA missionaries relocated to **Ecuador** in summer 2018.

AFRICA

Mission work in Continental Africa is changing. WELS' established missions—Malawi, Zambia, Cameroon, and Nigeria—focus on assisting the national synods and their churches as they mature, while also helping with their pre-seminary and seminary programs. The new work before WELS missionaries is outreach, as individuals and church groups in **nine additional African countries** have reached out to us and the Lutheran Church of Central Africa (LCCA) for fellowship and theological training. In response to this new gospel call, the One Africa Team was organized to coordinate WELS missionaries and resources. The One Africa Team is accountable for visiting the groups and synods seeking partnerships, teaching confessional Lutheran doctrine, and encouraging mission expansion.





Fast Facts

- The four established mission fields of Africa (Nigeria, Cameroon, Malawi, and Zambia) make up about 75 percent of all baptized souls in WELS world mission fields.
- Exploratory mission work is occurring in Ethiopia, Kenya, Liberia, Mozambique, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, South Sudan, Uganda, and Zimbabwe.



Faces of Faith - Stanley

Pastor Stanley Daile's story illustrates Jeremiah 1:5, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart." Born in Zambia, Stanley's biological parents gave him up for adoption. Instead of experiencing a tragic childhood of exploitation, Stanley was adopted by LCCA Pastor Akim Daile and grew up wanting to be a pastor himself. As part of the Chitumbuka-speaking minority in Northern Malawi, Stanley was at a slight disadvantage until he mastered the Chichewa tongue spoken by the majority of Malawians. No doubt his buoyant attitude and outgoing personality played a big part in this accomplishment. After six years of study, Stanley was assigned to Mtendere (Peace) Lutheran Church in Malawi, a congregation with a long history of many different pastors. Ten years later, the Lord's

hand is evident in this congregation's stability and growth. Mtendere now has an active youth program and is a thriving church body, but Pastor Daile asks, "WELS members, please continue to pray for the youth in our church that they do not fall away." We give thanks that the Lord set apart Pastor Daile to faithfully serve this urban congregation in a neighborhood of crime and poverty.

Faces of Faith-Violet

Violet Chikwatu has always wanted to help: "Malawi is a country where people are suffering from various types of diseases. I have travelled to many places and have seen that we don't have enough medical personnel to assist. I have a passion to help, which is why I became a nurse." Even Violet's pastor at Crown of Life Lutheran Church in Lilongwe, Malawi, saw her passion for helping others at a very young age: "Violet has been talking of working with the Lutheran Mobile Clinic for a very long time. Her knowledge and skills make her a great fit." Thanks to funds from the CAMM Althea Sauer scholarship fund, Violet enrolled in the Daeyang College of Nursing after finishing school. She successfully passed her nursing exam in 2017 and was offered a fulltime position with the Lutheran Mobile Clinic in February 2018. Her trust in God and the blessings God provided her is a visual representation of CAMM's mission in action.

CENTRAL AFRICA MEDICAL MISSION

The Central Africa Medical Mission (CAMM) started in 1961 in Lumano, Zambia. Today, CAMM oversees a permanent clinic called the Lutheran Mission Rural Health Centre in Zambia on the same property as one of the Lutheran churches of Central Africa. CAMM also operates the Lutheran Mobile Clinic in Malawi that travels to four different villages throughout the week. The buildings used in these villages serve as clinics during the week and as churches on Sundays. The Zambia clinic is completely run by national health care workers, and the Malawi clinic



is served by two U.S. employees who work alongside other nationals. Prior to clinic work starting for the day, a brief devotion is given to all who attend. Both clinics focus on providing Christian counseling and testing for HIV, education and treatment of malaria, immunizations, wellness education, and treatment of other minor injuries or illness. By partnering with the Lutheran Church of Central Africa and WELS missionaries, CAMM provides help for the spiritual and physical needs of the people in Zambia and Malawi.

Fast Facts

- CAMM relies solely on donations to continue operation.
- The Lutheran Mobile Clinic in Malawi saw
 43,598 people in 2017.
- The Zambia clinic hosts Children's Health Week twice a year to provide Vitamin A and deworming supplements.
- An average of **13,187** children per year, under the age of 5, are seen for wellness visits and immunizations at the Malawi clinic.
- 6,986 patients tested positive and received treatment for malaria at the Malawi clinic in 2017.

WELS MISSIONS ASIA-PACIFIC RIM

ASIA-PACIFIC RIM

WELS' mission work in the Asia-Pacific Rim occurs in a wide variety of countries and cultures—from Buddhist Thailand to Muslim Indonesia to Communist Vietnam to Roman Catholic Philippines. While each field is unique, the focus remains the same. WELS seeks to provide solid theological training to local workers, who in turn conduct gospel ministry in a way fitting for their culture. Some of the fields are wellestablished; like Indonesia, where the national church runs a fully accredited seminary. In other fields, opportunities are just beginning to present themselves. In Vietnam and the Philippines, the Lord is connecting us with people who are hungry for the refreshing truth of the gospel. In many of these countries, WELS' work is done in partnership with groups like Multi-Language Publications, the Pastoral Studies Institute, and WELS Christian Aid and Relief.

Faces of Faith-Stefanns

Stefanus came from a small village in Indonesia. His parents had come to faith when he was a small boy, offering their home as a gathering place until a small church building was erected by Gereja Lutheran Indonesia (GLI), WELS' sister church body in Indonesia. Already at the age of 15, Stefanus sensed a distinct difference between the faith of his ancestors and the teachings of the Bible. The former was a law-based system consisting of rules and regulations, which he had failed to

keep as a child. The latter was based on God's undeserved love for sinners. In the Bible he saw his sins, but he also saw his Savior and his salvation.

Life took Stefanus away from his small village but not away from his church. The GLI pastor from his new town visited him faithfully, and it was not long before the idea of becoming a pastor himself was planted in his heart.

Stefanus is now a pastor in the small village he grew up in. Recently he was chosen to serve as the chairman of a key GLI administrative board that governs Sekolah Tinggi Teologi Lutheran, the theological seminary of GLI. Whether in the congregation among his family and friends, or in the classroom full of young men training for ministry, he is a blessing to GLI as he continues to tell generations of God's mighty acts.

EAST ASIA

Due to government policies in East Asia aimed at restricting Christian activities, security is an ever-present concern as WELS works in East Asia. Local leaders are on the front lines of ministry, faithfully carrying on gospel work while missionaries assist leaders in the background. More than 500 souls are being served the Bread of Life each week. Because of security concerns, groups cannot be too large. Sermon-based Bible studies are being used for groups without a shepherd. Downloadable video sermons feed God's people, and prepared questions help the leader guide discussion afterwards.



Asia Lutheran Seminary in Hong Kong is using online instruction to extend the reach of worker training. Exciting opportunities abound as they blend live teaching with Internet-based learning platforms. They offer training for lay workers leading groups, as well as pastoral training for full-time students. Seminarians gather monthly in a central location to meet face-to-face with a professor for a week. All serve as leaders or helpers in their home churches.

Sometimes you're looking for a wife, and God wants to give you eternal life. Ask Larry. . . . Fifteen years ago, Larry lived in Hong Kong but didn't know Jesus. He then met a girl who was a member at a South Asian Lutheran Evangelical Mission (SALEM) church. She made it clear to him, "If you want to spend time with me on Sunday, you know where I am." He came to church, but only to chase a girl.

There were no other Christians in his family. Larry felt he could handle life by himself without God. But sitting in the church next to his girlfriend, he heard God's Word through WELS missionaries and local pastors. His doubts about Jesus gradually disappeared. He got married, and a year later he was baptized. Larry now comes every Sunday with his wife and two children. He's the head of the evangelism committee. He's the first to talk with non-Christian visitors. He's not afraid to tell his story. You can start out with wrong motives, but God doesn't care. Ask Larry. He found a wife and hope in eternal life!

SOUTH ASIA

WELS mission work in South Asia reaches into India, Pakistan, and Nepal.



Faces of Faith - Ashok + Vijay

What does WELS need to spread the good news of Jesus Christ in a country where few people speak English? You really need two men. One who has been seminary trained to train other men to be pastors, and one who has been seminary trained to translate materials into the language that the people speak. By God's grace we have two such men in Southern India. **Pastor Ashok Rao** and **Pastor Vijay Kumar** were in the first class to graduate from Christ Evangelical Lutheran Ministries' seminary in 2002. In the 15+ years since their graduation, these two men have faithfully served their church. Pastor Ashok was originally a school teacher. After his graduation he stepped back into the classroom as an instructor for those who were beginning their training to be a pastor. And Pastor Vijay, an Indian university graduate, took up the work

of translating materials into the Telugu language. These materials are now used in more than 150 congregations. We thank the Lord for these men and the blessing that their work has been for thousands of others, and we pray that they will continue to serve for years to come.

- Since 2002, our mission in Nepal has grown from 2 people to 4,000 members and is in 33 of the country's 77 districts.
- Despite threats from suicide bombers and the Taliban, the church in Pakistan has grown to 58 house churches, 21 Sunday Schools with 891 children, and 10 non-formal schools where children who work all day in the fields learn how to read and write.
- Nepali Christians have opened a door for outreach to Tibetan refugees. When they return to their homeland of Tibet, our prayer is that they share the gospel with others.
- Plans are being made to open a Bible institute in Pakistan in 2018, where leaders will be trained in God's Word and learn how to teach his Word to others.

"Who left this booklet in the bathroom?" she wondered, "Someone like me is reading this and doesn't want anyone to see her." She knew a person could be killed if they were seen reading Christian literature.

Rasham saw a cleaning woman and wondered, "Could she be the one?" She approached her and asked, "Did you hide this book in the bathroom?" Caught off guard the cleaning lady simply replied, "Yes." Quickly Rasham told her, "I, too, have been reading this book. Do you have more?"

She knew where to find more. Thanks to the cleaning woman, Rasham studied all 12 booklets in the Bible Teaching Series from Multi-Language Publications. She even took them to her family and studied them with her husband and children. Thanks be to God that this family was able to learn more about Jesus!



MULTI-LANGUAGE PUBLICATIONS

Multi-Language Publications (MLP) has printed more than 2.9 million items in more than 52 languages to date. Today, MLP has incorporated audio, video, and online training resources to its offerings. The MLP Christian literature library is available to assist and enhance outreach for churches in fellowship with WELS and for use in places where WELS does not have resident missionaries. The majority of MLP products are evangelism and Bible study materials to be used by anyone who sees a need for ministering to others in Christ.

EUROPE

WELS World Missions conducts gospel outreach throughout Europe, preaching Christ's grace in Russia, Albania, Bulgaria, and Ukraine while supporting sister church bodies in Norway, Sweden, Finland, Germany, Portugal, Latvia, and the Czech Republic. The focus of European mission work is changing. Instead of leading congregations, missionaries will focus on equipping and training national pastors to lead their own congregations. The Pastoral Studies Institute (PSI) is partnering in this work, making training visits to Germany, Sweden, Russia, and Ukraine.

Faces of Faith-Itsov

God can turn any adversity into unexpected blessing. **Iliyan Itsov**, a Roma (or gypsy) from Bulgaria, suffered injuries from a serious car accident early on in life. While he was recovering, his pastor asked him to consider becoming a pastor in the Bulgarian Lutheran Church. After completing the three-year seminary program in Ukraine, a different issue presented itself: The Bulgarian Lutheran Church had no place for him to serve. The WELS Board for World Missions stepped in and called Iliyan to begin a new mission effort, called Outreach to Roma.

Following the example of St. Paul in Acts, Itsov gathers interested people in a village, asks them to select a leader, and then provides that leader with training and materials to use. Itsov may visit two or three times a month, but in his absence the leader conducts worship by reading sermons Itsov provides. Five groups, scattered across Bulgaria, are worshiping regularly. In addition, the Outreach to Roma van regularly hauls seven or eight people to services in Dunavtsi, Bulgaria.



Even after Itsov battled serious health issues, the Lord continues to use Itsov's ministry. During a worship service in the village of Zlataritsa in November 2017, 21 people were baptized. In March 2018, 20 people were confirmed there. We pray that Outreach to Roma will see a growing number brought to the gospel as God turns the adversity of Roma people's earthly lives into eternal blessings.

APACHE RESERVATION

2018 marks the 125th anniversary of WELS' world mission work on the Apache reservation in Arizona. To celebrate their history, Apache Christians look forward—to the hundreds of Apache family members and neighbors who still need to hear the gospel, and to the 535 other Native American tribes in North America who do not know Jesus as their Savior. Three ministries have been selected as areas of focus for this special anniversary year:

- 1. Apache Christian Training School (ACTS): ACTS provides training and resources to prepare Apache Christians for ministry leadership on the reservation. Expansion is needed to meet the needs of current congregations and train workers for future outreach to other reservations.
- 2. Lutheran Church of the Open Bible, Whiteriver, Ariz.: Additional trained workers are needed as Open Bible looks to expand outreach opportunities, small group study and support groups, addiction recovery ministry, grief counseling, youth ministry, and worship opportunities.
- 3. Peridot-Our Savior's Lutheran School: With enrollment rising from 75 to 130 in four years, expansion is needed to catch up with growth and prepare for additional gospel outreach in the future.





- **Expand** current ministry at ACTS, Lutheran Church of the Open Bible, and Peridot-Our Savior's Lutheran School.
- Connect Apache Christians across the 4-million-acre reservation and within nine current congregations via a new website, preparing and encouraging all church members for personal evangelism.
- **Begin** outreach to the 535 other Native American tribes in North America.

Faces of Faith-Bernard

Bernard Dale is a shining light in the Apache Lutheran Church. He continues to take Apache Christian Training School (ACTS) classes in hopes to serve more effectively as a leader in the church, the Apache community, and prayerfully one day in a paid position! But life and service hasn't been easy. Bernard, a life-long member of Shepherd in the Pines Lutheran Church in McNary, Ariz., fell away from God's way. He got involved in drugs and alcohol, and one night sustained nearly-fatal stab wounds in an attack. In his

state of injury, feeling worthless and useless, he fell into depression. Once he came back to church, he started to feel comfortable again and was asked to serve. First in small ways: cleaning, helping at events, going to Bible study. Now he hungers for the deep study of God's Word; attends Bible class several times a week; and volunteers at church, in the recovery ministry, at children's music camps, and more! Bernard says, "Serving the Lord feels great. ... Try it, don't give up, because it'll make your day awesome!"



Working with local talent in East Asia

Multi-Language Publications (MLP) supports world mission fields with translations of existing English books into Chinese for training and outreach. A new initiative is underway to work with local writers and artists to develop culturally fitting materials with an appealing Asian flavor that will engage educated, young adults living in heavily populated cities throughout East Asia. The new materials are uniquely designed to reach an educated, urbanite demographic in new ways, but with the same saving message of the gospel.

MLP's East Asia coordinator is helping cultivate the local contributors as they write online devotions for social media, develop a discipleship series titled, "Living in Faith," and design complimentary illustrations for the series. Distributing the pure gospel becomes more urgent as East Asia's regulations and censorship of outside influences of Christianity grow tighter each day. MLP, along with WELS brothers and sisters in East Asia, are working together to create usable resources for future generations.

Expanding social media



More than one million followers

Multi-Language Publications (MLP) and WELS world mission field in Latin America are celebrating the three-year anniversary of the Academia Cristo online training and church multiplication program. By God's grace, Academia Cristo has more than one million followers on Facebook. The milestone is especially encouraging because it has led to connections with potential leaders that are looking to start churches in areas where there is no WELS presence. Academia Cristo is globally connecting Spanish-speaking men who, through the online program, will be equipped to start churches to faithfully proclaim

God's Word. WELS world missionaries and national pastors serve as mentors to the new group leaders while MLP assists in the production of biblically sound liturgy, worship and Bible study materials for use by the start-up house churches. The resources are available on the Academia Cristo website, while the Academia Cristo Facebook page ignites interest and sign-up for the online courses. This unique training method teaches Bible lessons and, at the same time, teaches students how to share the lessons, or any lesson from the Bible, with others.

WELS missionaries and Academia Cristo teachers recently met with 16 men in Latin America interested in further training, including leaders in five countries outside the current reach of WELS World Missions. The follow-up meetings with active online students are another way to offer continuing support for church multiplication in new areas around the world.

Developing new content



Translator workshop to improve skills

Multi-Language Publications (MLP) is partnering with WELS World Mission's One Africa Team to provide an opportunity for translators to improve their skills. Those from Africa, Nepal, and India who seek training can attend the once-in-a-generation workshop from July 17 to 27, 2018. Dr. Ernst R. Wendland will conduct the ten-day workshop in Lusaka, Zambia.

Dr. Wendland has been serving in Zambia for 50 years as seminary professor and translation coordinator. As a member of the Zambia Bible Society, he has been involved with the

production of twelve different Bible translations. Translation is as much of an art as a science because no two languages convey concepts in exactly the same way. To illustrate, in John 3:16, the Greek New Testament literally says, "Thus indeed loved God the world that the Son the only begotten he gave that everyone believing in Him not should perish but might have life eternal." Is it possible to understand the meaning of this literal translation? Absolutely. Is this something that your seventh grade confirmation student will find easy to memorize, or for you to listen to on a Sunday morning? Not especially.

The coursework will include hands on practice of translating texts from English into local languages, as well as insights into simplifying English texts prior to translating them. One of the translators is a visually impaired woman from Ethiopia who is also fluent in Braille. Other translators are coming from Malawi, Zambia, Mozambique, Sudan, India, Nepal, Zimbabwe, Kenya, and Cameroon. There is great value in bringing translators together from various parts of the world so that they can share their experiences and insights into the translation process.

On the day of Pentecost the Holy Spirit miraculously granted the apostles the ability to speak foreign languages. Although it takes great patience and determination to learn another language today, our attitude is the same as the apostles, "We cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20). As new listeners hear the gospel message proclaimed in their mother tongue, may the Holy Spirit add them to the number of people being saved.





WELS Christian Aid and Relief

Our Calling

WELS Christian Aid and Relief serves as our synod's "ministry of compassion," bringing physical relief to victims of natural disasters in the form of cash grants, food, clothing, and medical supplies. Christian Aid and Relief also partners with WELS missionaries to support humanitarian aid projects to help build bridges to proclaim the gospel. The mission of Christian Aid and Relief is drawn from the Scriptural encouragement, **"Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers."** Galatians 6:10 Because of all that Christ has done for us, we are eager to reflect Christ's love and compassion to those in need. We seek to personalize our efforts by conducting careful assessments and distributing our funds through our churches and missions. We bring in volunteers when requested to assist in the recovery effort.



Our Current Situation

Christian Aid and Relief is not funded in the WELS budget, but by the special gifts of WELS members.

From January 1st to December 31st, 2017 our total expenditures for relief projects were \$559,854. \$405,221 was expended for domestic relief efforts and \$154,633 for foreign relief efforts. In addition, \$327,475 was designated for Humanitarian Aid projects for fiscal year 2017-2018 which assist our missionaries in building bridges to proclaim the Gospel.

General aide was provided to food pantries, inner city relief and general aid for called workers and congregational members suffering from extreme medical and financial burdens, totaling \$295,000.

Hurricane Relief was a major focus of our efforts this past year with grants totaling \$415,000 as of February 28.

Humanitarian Aid Projects


At their June 2017 meeting, WELS Christian Aid and Relief approved \$327,475 for humanitarian aid grants for FY 17-18. These projects help our missionaries reflect Christ's love to people in need, and also open doors to share the Gospel. Major items include health clinics, borehole drilling to provide clean water, support for a women's skill center, home based care for the chronically ill and dying, food assistance to the needy adult literacy classes, food and nutrition to orphans, medical equipment, and health clinics. Grants have increased recently to more home mission congregations especially welcoming new legal immigrants in cross cultural situations.

Home Missions receiving grants this year are:

Las Vegas, NV, Toronto, Canada, Texas, Boise, Idaho.

World mission fields receiving grants this year are:

Africa – Zambia, Malawi, Nigeria & Central African Medical Mission Asia Pacific Rim – Thailand and Indonesia, Europe – Russia, Albania, Bulgaria, Ukraine South Asia – Nepal, Pakistan, and India Latin America – Mexico







Medical and Financial Emergencies

Our committee also assists local congregations as they reach out to display Christian love and compassion to their members facing natural disasters, medical emergencies and financial crisis. Contact our chairman, Pastor Robert Hein to learn more about how we can match or even exceed your local efforts. This in cludes supporting congregational efforts to provide aid and relief to your community recovering from a natural disaster.

Hurricane & Diaster Relief Update

Christian Aid and Relief personalizes our efforts by working through our congregations and missions in the affected areas. We work through our pastors and synod and congregational leaders to make assessments and distribute aid. We bring in volunteers when requested to assist in the recovery effort.



Puerto Rico

Our liaison to Puerto Rico, Pastor Tim Satorius, keeps in contact with pastors and leaders of the Confessional Evangelical Lutheran Church of Puerto Rico. Pastor Satorius and a representative from Christian Aid and Relief made a personal assessment visit to Puerto Rico in October. One church there was completely destroyed, another was damaged, and several homes of members were damaged. Groceries were provided to families in need. We sent an immediate gift of \$5000 through Direct Relief to assist those in need. We also sent \$5000 to provide meals for people in the church and community suffering from this disaster. This enabled members of the national church to provide meals for 50 people a day for four weeks.

In January 2018 President Mark Schroeder, World Mission Administrator Larry Schlomer, Director of Missions Operations Sean Young, and Pastor Tim Satorious made a personal visit to Puerto Rico to meet with national leaders and further discuss ways we can help. Christian Aid and Relief approved their proposal to engage a Spanish speaking WELS pastor for one year to serve as a consultant with the national leaders in developing a specific plan for recovery efforts and also strengthen our relationship with this National Church, assisting them with ministry enhancement and training workers. Pastor Larry Schlomer Sr. accepted this position. Specific rebuilding plans will be brought to Christian Aid and Relief for approval. Then we will recruit and organize volunteers to assist from our volunteer database.

Florida

Volunteers, with the help of our disaster relief trailers, assisted with the cleanup efforts in several affected communities. Those who have received assistance are most appreciative and wish to express their gratitude for a job well done. Pastors in the affected areas brought requests to us for immediate aid for their members through our District President Chuck Westra. This included generators and equipment, rental assistance while being displaced from home, and assistance with cost of repairs and replacement of furnishings. We assisted Abiding Grace, Covington, GA as their church suffered water damage from the storm and brought in volunteers to repair a roof at Calvary Lutheran Academy in Florida.





Our Current Situation continued

Hurricane & Diaster Relief Update

Texas

Volunteers from neighboring churches helped with the initial cleanup efforts in several affected areas. The equipment included in our disaster relief trailers was put to good use. We have been blessed with wonderful volunteers and a project coordinator who came in to help with rebuilding efforts. They did great work putting in countless hours repairing a parsonage and church at Christ our Savior, Angleton, TX, the school at Sienna Plantation Academy, and about 17 member homes in the Friendswood, TX area. The volunteers often express the joy they experience serving their Lord as they serve these people in their time of need. We have also received wonderful expressions of gratitude from the families we assisted. We also provided grants to replace furnishings and appliances to homes which were ruined by the flooding. Volunteers will complete a few more home repair projects in the Houston area in Spring 2018.



Antigua, Barbuda and Dominica

Assistance was provided to families displaced from Barbuda, who are staying with members and friends of our WELS mission, St. John, Antigua. 29 families received \$18,000 in immediate aid so far. Funds were also distributed to assist families in Dominica affected by the hurricane. Our liaison Pastor Tom Spiegelberg has visited Antigua and is helping us make further assessment of needs and opportunities.


We express our appreciataion to many volunteers, including from Builders for Christ, who have been a tremendous blessing to these recovery efforts.

Annually, Christian Aid and Relief reviews humanitarian aid grant requests forwarded to us from the Board for World Missions and Board for Home Missions. These projects help build bridges for proclaiming the Gospel to the people we serve in our mission fields.

WELS Christian Aid and Relief continues to look for ways to improve its communication to the members of our synod. "Lifeline" videos have been developed so that those who support our work can see firsthand how their gifts are being used. Our Web page www.welsnet/relief continues to offer timely information and a convenient way to donate online for Christian Aid and Relief projects. Members can also find us on Facebook at Christian Aid and Relief. Committee members and volunteers also make presentations to various groups to "tell our stories", letting WELS members know about the needs and opportunities to help people through Christian Aid and Relief. DVD's of Lifeline Videos and other written materials and photos are also available upon request. We are partnering with other WELS agencies, such as Kingdom Workers, Wisconsin Lutheran Child and Family Service, and the nurses association to coordinate volunteers to assist in relief efforts when appropriate.

Humanitarian Aid Projects June 2017 – 2018

Christian Aid and Relief continues to partner with the WELS Board for World Missions, Board for Home Missions, WELS Missionaries, and our sister congregations of the Confessional Evangelical Lutheran Conference around the world in funding humanitarian aid projects which reflect Christ's love through acts of kindness to people in need and builds bridges to proclaim the good news of God's love through Jesus. Below is a list of humanitarian aid projects for FY 2017-18 totaling \$327,475. We praise God for all those who helped to fund these projects through their special gifts!

Albania

Christian Aid and Relief provides funding for Christmas and Easter food baskets for needy individuals in their congregation and in their neighborhoods. Invitations and information about the congregation are shared with the recipients of the baskets.

Bulgaria

Funding has been granted to provide packages with food products, along with Christian books and brochures, for visitors to major festival worship services. With the Lord's blessing this will help build bridges to share the gospel with more people and to maintain connections for ongoing ministry contact.

CAMM – Central African Medical Missions

The Central African Medical Missions in Malawi and Zambia receive funding from Christian Aid and Relief for medical supplies and nutritional supplements for infants. CAMM currently provides medical care at four clinics which also serve as LCCA churches. These humanitarian efforts help serve as a bridge for proclaiming the gospel.

India

Medical aid to India has been approved to provide supplies for government and private hospitals and health clinics. This includes basic necessities such as blood pressure cuffs and thermometers, hospital beds, baby warmers, and more sophisticated equipment such as an instrument to test for glaucoma. Funds have also been granted for the digging of approximately 20 fresh water wells. As with most of the humanitarian work in India, these projects may not open new doors directly for gospel "bridge building," but they will help to ensure that the doors to India will remain open for WELS counselors living and working there. These kinds of projects are necessary for our presence in India to continue; it is excellent and necessary PR with the local medical community, government officials, and other influential people.

Humanitarian Aid Projects June 2017 – 2018 continued

Indonesia

Funding has been granted to assist congregations in Indonesia to hand out staple food items to needy households in their neighborhoods. In some cases, books and school supplies will be given to needy children. The hope and prayer is that caring and sharing will provide a bridge with these people by letting them know the location of the source of the aid and by strengthening the churches' reputation and communication among their neighbors.

Malawi

Funding by WELS Christian Aid and Relief for boreholes dug in Mayaka and Nagome are now functional for the people in these villages for drinking, cooking and cleaning. These two wells open the door for the gospel message to be shared by allowing permanent churches to be built. A vicar will be called with the well nearby to supply water for his family. Vacation Bible school and other programs can now be held knowing that there will be water for the children to drink. Water is such a basic human need and without it there is no life. What a bless-ing to be able to provide water and at the same time provide the living gospel message for the people of Malawi to drink so they may enjoy eternal life!



Mexico

Funding for the Costa Maya Ministries Education Center allows the mission in Mahahual to provide a place where the locals can come to hear the Word of God, receive a weekly meal and participate in Bible studies and other outreach opportunities.

Nigeria

Funds have been granted to Nigeria to help in the distribution of health care for people in great need, many of which are not members of the local church. The ability to offer care and provide humanitarian aid to Nigeria's unchurched will serve as a bridge for Christ the King and All Saints Lutheran Churches of Nigeria to invite villagers to church to hear the gospel. Funds will also be used to help offer pharmacy services and health education in rural areas demonstrating the loving care of Lutheran Christians. Aid will provide support for church members to visit rehab centers, hospitals, prisons, orphanages and health centers and to assist widows, widowers, and people with special needs.

Humanitarian Aid Projects June 2017 – 2018 continued

Nepal

Aid supplied to Nepal provides funding for health clinics. At each clinic, workers minister to the physical and spiritual needs of those who receive care. Christian literature is distributed. Clinics often lead to the formation of a Bible study group, and eventually have developed into local churches. Aid is provided to reach out to women in rural and remote areas to offer activities and sessions to improve basic skills. Offering these skills provides opportunities to share the gospel. Aid also provides textbooks for higher secondary level students in several districts in the Himalayan area near the Tibetan border. This opens doors for sharing the gospel in these areas and helps to train future leaders and teachers of the Christian church. Funds have also been granted to provide mosquito nets for victims of local flooding. These nets will protect people from mosquito-borne illnesses and even from snake bites. Providing these nets will provide opportunities to share the love and the hope they have through Chrit.

Pakistan

In Pakistan, funding has been granted to provide medical care for many families and assist with crippling debt. The kindness shown to those in desperate need opens doors to share the good news of the Great Physician of both body and soul. Funding has also been granted to train women in basic skills like knitting, stitching, and embroidery. Each session begins and ends with a gospel devotion. By learning these skills, women can then support themselves and be spared ill treatment in the public market place and work safely from home to receive income to support their families as well as mission work in Pakistan.

Funding has been provided to help toward the cost of medical procedures needed by many families without the means to pay. This kindness shown to folks in desperate life and death situations provides opportunities to share the best news of a Savior. Aid has also been granted for food distribution at Christmas and Easter in neighborhoods bordering Christian homes and schools.

Russia

Funding has been granted to Russia to provide food, clothing, hygiene items, school supplies, and medicine for the needy. These gifts will allow for the Law-Gospel pamphlets to be distributed and to invite people to Bible instruction classes. This will let the workers' light shine in the area and grow their reputation of helping those in need. Aid has also been granted to assist institutions such as hospitals, rehab centers, orphanages, and half-way houses. The government values this work and presence, which is very important as it opens the doors for Bible classes and Christian counseling. Through this ministry, Christian literature is left in public schools, rehab centers, and other institutions. These efforts provide additional connections to the local congregations as they reach out to the villages.

Thailand

We continue to support the efforts of medically trained volunteers who travel to Thailand to set up week long medical clinics in our village churches. As these clinics draw people from both local and neighboring villages, they provide the missionaries and other workers with a unique bridge for presenting the gospel and for creating good-will presence for our churches through such care and service. Eye glasses and hearing amplifiers are two of the many gifts that are shared with the people. These gifts not only open their eyes and ears to the world around them, but open their hearts to a clearer understanding of the love that Jesus has for them through the witnessing of the unconditional love of those providing for their needs. VBS and ELS classes are offered and follow up contacts are made after the classes conclude.

Humanitarian Aid Projects June 2017 – 2018 continued

Ukraine

Funding has been granted to provide food assistance for war refugees and help for orphans. This assistance serves as a good Christian witness to many people and shows the love of God to many in great need. It also provides for the opportunity to share the love of God to those who join in worship.

Zambia

Christian Aid and Relief provides funding for home-based care that bridges the physical and spiritual care of the chronically ill and dying. This grant will help prepare the Christians in this ministry to better meet the needs of the community through acts of sharing God's gracious gift of salvation as they help those with AIDS, TB, Malaria, and other chronic and terminal illnesses. Funds have also been granted to support a literacy program. A person who is able to read and write is well positioned to do God's work more efficiently, especially where evangelism is concerned. The Central African Medical Mission in Zambia receives funding for medical supplies and medicines that help support the mission of communicating Christ's love and sharing caring concern for the physical needs of others. Another project will help touch the lives of people with special needs by providing wheelchairs, showing them the passion, love and mercy that Christ has for all people. This work of compassion is performed so the gospel may reach those in need.

Las Vegas, Nevada

In the Las Vegas, NV, area funding has been granted to assist in African refugee/immigrant Outreach. As new African immigrants arrive in this area, congregation members can welcome them, provide a welcome gift (cooking pots, dinnerware, toiletries, soap...), assist them in getting settled into the community, help with English needs, provide rides, and further assist with counseling, ESL training, etc. The intent of this ministry is to assist the refugee immigrants as they transition to life in America, using this opportunity to proclaim to them the gospel of Jesus through personal witness, worship services and Bible classes.

Texas

Congregations in several Texas communities have created outreach events that assist underprivileged families of school age children with much needed school supplies. In conjunction with backpacks and the supplies that are given to the children, Bible stories and videos are shared. Food for all is always part of the days' event, along with games and prizes for the kids. Parents receive information about the church and the programs that are offered throughout the year. Through this effort the congregations seek to encourage families to become a part of their church family and join in Christian fellowship and worship on a regular basis.

Toronto

Funds have been granted to Hope Lutheran Church in Toronto, Ontario, as they coordinate a Welcome Project. This project enables the congregation to provide valuable humanitarian assistance to newcomers to their area. The assistance can take the form of food, rental help, and guidance with other matters pertaining to their transition into the area. This project helps Hope Lutheran show Christ's love to new refugees.

WISCONSIN LUTHERAN SEMINARY SPOTLIGHT

GRADUATION

This May, 31 students graduated, 27 with a Master of Divinity degree and four awarded a Master of Sacred Theology degree. The assignment committee placed 26 seniors who were receiving their first calls. Other assignments included four from the class of 2016. In addition, four were reassigned to one-year calls. At the same service, 26 middlers were assigned to congregations throughout North America to serve for their vicar year. Ask the Lord of the Harvest to send out workers into his harvest field!



ACCREDITATION

Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary hosted a preliminary visit from the Association of Theological Schools (ATS). It is step one on our path of exploring accreditation. The visit was helpful and allayed many concerns about the process. While the seminary is still some distance away from accreditation itself, it looks very much as if—as a preliminary move—the seminary will receive an Associate Membership with ATS this summer.

We can see the value of accreditation both for our United States programs of continuing education and to offer support for our sister seminaries overseas. For them, affiliation with an accredited US seminary increases their credibility and the ease with which they can receive official recognition in their home country. There are three steps to membership. Schools initially join as Associate Members upon a vote by the membership. Within five years, Associate Members are expected to pursue Candidate for Accredited Membership. Then, once a school has completed the requirements of the Commission on Accrediting, it is recognized with Accredited Membership. If at any stage it becomes apparent that our theology or mission would be compromised, the process would be halted from our side.

FACULTY NEWS

The governing board is putting a hold on issuing another call for a professor to teach New Testament and homiletics. President Paul Wendland has announced that at the end of the 2018–19 school year he will step down from the office of president and move into a fulltime teaching position in the New Testament department at the seminary. He has served as president since 2004. A call for nominations to fill the seminary president position has been sent out. When that position is filled, seminary administration and the governing board will determine what teaching areas need to be filled and ask for nominations to fill that need.



SEMINARY CHORUS

The Seminary Chorus went west on their tour this spring. They stopped at congregations in Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, Colorado, and Alberta.



PSI UPDATE - A VISIT TO SOUTH ASIA

Last month, Professor Brad Wordell taught the doctrine of conversion in South Asia. "Whenever I visit one of our mission fields, goal #1 is 'Do no harm and encourage the saints,'" shares Wordell. His "students" are Lutheran pastors who gather together four times a year in order to support their continuing education.

By the end of this brief Pastors Institute, these pastors were able to:

- Discuss key issues regarding the doctrine of conversion, including differing views.
- Define conversion and put it into the context of all the gracious activities of the Holy Spirit.
- Read the various conversion stories in the Bible with an eye towards God's grace.
- Explain and defend the Bible's teaching about conversion with key Bible passages.
- Articulate how the doctrine of conversion informs the doctrine and practice of their ministries.

One of the pastors in South Asia shares, "Because of sola scriptura and sola gratia, our study of conversion has made me proud to be a Lutheran pastor."







Pray boldly that we use this celebration to recruit with rigor countless Christian witnesses . . . to increase our financial support of our students . . . and to provide the necessary facilities to equip our students for their future ministries.

We engaged a consulting firm to assist with our planning by analyzing our facility usage. This Campus Master Plan reflects the work of that firm.

The majority of MLC's facilities are more than 50 years old. The Christians of that generation who gave so generously to the existing campus have been such a blessing to this ministry. Unfortunately, buildings are not timeless, even if what is spoken within them is. Now is our generation's turn. We pray that this developing site plan will guide the college through the next five decades, providing for both programmed maintenance and the construction of new ministry training facilities. Naturally, such a bold vision will be phased in over the years. In the next few months, we will carefully prioritize the implementation of this site plan relative to our ministry needs so we can utilize the thank offerings we receive in the wisest way.

FREQUENTLY AS KED QUI

WILL I BE ABLE TO AFFORD SENDING MY STUDENT TO MLS?

MLS families come from a wide variety of financial backgrounds. We never want finances to be the thing that keeps a student from the opportunities that MLS offers. A lot of people get scared by the "sticker price," but the reality is that few pay that full amount themselves. All families can apply for financial aid. Many churches also take advantage of our 25% matching program to support students who go to MLS. You may also want to factor in that there are some things that you won't have to pay for if your student is at MLS in the dorms, such as gas money for daily trips to and from school as well as meals for a bottomless teenage appetite.

WHAT IF MY SON OR DAUGHTER DOESN'T WANT TO BE A PASTOR OR TEACHER? CAN THEY STILL COME?

Very few students know what they want to be at age 14. That's okay. If college students change their major 3 times on average, we aren't surprised that 8th graders don't know what they want to do yet. We simply ask that students keep an open mind while they are at MLS. We think that the public ministry is a great thing, and we want lots of young people to think about it seriously. We are going to give them opportunities to observe and experience ministry, and after that, they can make an informed decision. Either way, the church is going to be blessed by these young people. Some will be pastors and teachers. Some won't. But all of them will be prepared to be Christian servants wherever they land.

HOW CAN I SEND MY CHILD AWAY FOR HIGH SCHOOL?

When you send your child to MLS, you're not just sending them away. You're sending them TO something. You are planting them into a spiritual community where they will have the opportunity to grow in their faith several times every day. You are sending them to a family of believers that will love and care for them. You are giving them good Christian friends and mentors. You're sending them to a place that will help you raise your child with you, not for you. If you're scared about sending your child to MLS for high school, that's okay. We'd be a little worried if you weren't. Over our 100+ years of experience, thousands of parents have done what you are thinking about. Don't take our word for it. Talk to them! Let us know, and we can put you in touch with some real live MLS parents.

THERE AREN'T MANY (OR ANY) OTHER STUDENTS FROM OUR CHURCH OR SCHOOL. WILL MY STUDENT MAKE FRIENDS?

If there's anything we have a lot of confidence in at MLS, it's that our students are like a family. MLS alumni are well known for having friendships that last past their time at MLS. Also consider this: most students arrive at MLS looking for new friends, so your student won't be alone. The majority of our dorm students are either the only student from their school or are from out of state. Many students meet their first friends at basketball tournaments, sports camps, and recruitment events. Come visit!



WELS churches are hearing a lot about "compassion ministry." The Commission on Special Ministries has advocated for compassion ministry since it was founded. Our motto is "Love in Action." Christian compassion is not new or foreign to the church. The New Testament urges the followers of Christ to serve one another in love: "Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth" (1 John 3:18).

People who struggle with problems leave the church when no one at church reaches out to help them. We don't have to have the answers. Maybe we don't know where to find the answers. But we can say, "I

don't know how to help, but I want you to know I'm glad you're here. I'll pray for a solution. How I can help?"

Outreach is harder when people believe that churches are uncaring. Compassion ministry grows strong bonds with members who face challenges. Our concern for people in our community with special needs shows the public that the love of Christ is real.

If you love someone, you listen to them. If you listen to people with special needs, you'll find that they want to participate in the church. Hard of hearing people want to be on the church council. Blind people want other members to talk to them after church.

Love leads to inclusion. God has given all Christians gifts to serve, even if that Christian struggles with an addiction or has a developmental disability. It is well worth the effort to find ways to include people with special needs in serving. People are not defined by what they can't do. Instead, our churches are blessed when people with special needs can serve and not just be served.

Compassion ministry opens church doors to hurting or struggling people in the community. Families with relatives in jail are drawn to churches with active jail ministry. Members will invite families of children with special needs when Sunday School classes are prepared to include such children.

It doesn't happen without conscious effort. Compassion moves the congregation to extend invitations continually and to keep promoting their resources for people who might need them.

Special Ministries has resources and guidance for churches that have compassion on members of the church or of the community. We can help you demonstrate love in action.

Deaf and Hard of Hearing One size does not fit all

The Mission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (MDHH) helps churches and other ministries serve two very different populations. Even among the deaf and the hard of hearing, a diversity of experience, challenges, and solutions exist. One size does not fit all!

Yet all people with hearing loss need Jesus. That reality unites the MDHH in striving to educate and provide resources for church leaders and members. People with hearing loss can worship and be active in their church.

MDHH can help you solve the "sign language challenge." A deaf visitor to a WELS church said that he learned to love Lutheran worship when he was in college, but he needed an interpreter. The church

Visually Impaired Who is helping whom?

Technology is helping us to break down many Special Ministries barriers. The Mission for the Visually Impaired (MVI) is a great example. For years, MVI had a printed catalog of resources. Of course, blind people could not read it! We assumed that a family member or friend would help our patrons choose materials.

Christian literature in Braille has always been available through this catalog. MVI also offers large print materials and audio cassette recordings of Christian literature and music.

Today, the MVI committee includes blind members. They use the computer with the assistance of technology called JAWS, which tells them what is on the screen. These leaders are guiding us to make quality spiritual resources available online. Within the next year, we hope to offer an online library of audio books. The resources are also available to anyone who has any disability that prevents them from reading a book. The MVI catalog will soon be revised so that the blind can search for themselves.

contacted MDHH. The next Sunday the church had an interpreter and even several MDHH members to meet the man and assess his situation! Answering questions about interpreting and helping to locate interpreters are two MDHH services. An online course on American Sign Language and deaf culture is offered annually through Martin Luther College to broaden knowledge and skills among WELS members.

People with mild hearing loss shouldn't miss parts of the sermon. An Assistive Listening Device, such as the Williams Sound System and a headset, can help. For those who wear hearing aids equipped with a T-switch, a hearing loop can greatly improve understanding and participation in worship.

MDHH helps churches understand the importance of including deaf and hardof-hearing members in worship and other activities, which brings wonderful blessings.

Both the deaf and hard of hearing were created to be part of the Body of Christ. MDHH helps churches understand the importance of including deaf and hard-of-hearing members in worship and other activities, which brings wonderful blessings. Far from needing pity, these brothers and sisters in Christ can bring spiritual perspectives, talents, and experience to the life of the church, usually with just a bit of help from technology. We serve each other with our gifts. That's how Jesus created his church!

Conquerors through Christ *Getting it right about moral issues*

Have you ever expressed disapproval of pornography and been met with a blank look? After a generation of industry marketing, many accept porn as a healthy part of sexuality.

Parish Nursing Personalizing our church family's love

What congregation doesn't need people with gifts of teaching and administration? Many tasks require someone who is good at interacting with people, quick with Christian insight and encouragement, and being generally helpful.

Did you think "parish nurse" when you read the description above? Maybe you've never had such a position and think it an unnecessary addition to the church worker list. But WELS churches with an active parish nurse program will strongly recommend it. "Church family" evokes an image of caring for each other, and parish nursing personalizes that love.

A WELS parish nurse is a currently licensed Registered Nurse (RN) who promotes both physical and spiritual wellness in the congregation. The parish nurse conducts a wellness-based and non-invasive practice, and the ministry is performed according to the congregation's mission statement and under the direction of the pastor.

Christ Lutheran Church, Eden Prairie, Minn., summarizes the work this way: "The primary purpose of the congregation is to spread the Gospel of Salvation in Jesus Christ. In addition, a congregation serves as a 'home' and a 'family' to its members who have not only spiritual needs but also physical, emotional, and psychological needs . . . The Ministry. . . is one way to encourage this sharing of God's love and the growth of faith among those with special needs related to health."

Well-trained parish nurses can be a great blessing to your family of faith.

Well-trained parish nurses can be a great blessing to your family of faith. Pastor Mike Woldt of David's Star Lutheran Church, Jackson, Wis., lists these advantages:

- Good training will help parish nurses share the law and gospel message of Scripture with the people they serve.
- Good training will help parish nurses function within the framework of the congregation and in partnership with the called leaders of the church.
- Good training will help parish nurses recognize opportunities for serving God's people with the abilities they possess and the skills they have cultivated as practicing nurses.

A regular gathering of caregivers can bless church members with fellowship and encouragement. As a bonus, it can serve as an outreach to the community.

Prison Ministry *Remembering those behind bars*

Many would be surprised to learn that the early Christian church needed to do prison ministry. Yes, needed. John the Baptizer and Jesus were incarcerated, of course. The Book of Acts relates several instances of the apostles being jailed. Many followers of Jesus were locked up for the "crime" of being a Christian.

That's why the New Testament instructs: "Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering." (Hebrews 13:3)

Prison Ministry was organized to provide WELS seniors a way to "remember those in prison" in a distinctly gospel-based structure for volunteering. From the start, pen pal opportunities and Bible study correspondence focused on sharing the gospel. The original structure was well thought out, and today is no longer limited to senior involvement. Our ministry to men and women behind bars has grown and been refined as we understand more about the experience of incarceration and how much impact Bible study can have. The central office and our volunteers respond quickly to letters and correspondence course tests, recognizing the isolation of those who are doing time. We continually bring Christ and His salvation into our communication, understanding that everyone needs to know about their Savior, including those who struggle with their guilt alone in a prison cell.

Prison Ministry also trains WELS and ELS laypeople to serve inmates in local jails through Jail Ministry Team Training (JMTT), in keeping with our emphasis on empowering face-to-face ministry.

Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities

Inclusion can be the key

C.S. Lewis once pointed out that "membership" came into common language through Paul's writing about the "Body of Christ." He said that the world wants to define a "member" in terms of how all members are alike.

In the Body of Christ, the members are not the same, but they belong to each other. Family members (mother, father, child, grandparent) are also very different. They use their position to love and help each other. Members are not alike and don't have to be the same in order to serve God's purpose.

How many members of your church can you identify as intellectually or developmentally disabled? Statistically, one in six children have one or more developmental disabilities! Many of these do not remain members of the church when they grow up. Yet God created them to be members of his body.

WELS Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Ministry (IDDM) seeks to help congregations share the gospel with those who have

Chaplain Certification *Going outside the walls*

In case it escaped your notice, people are not generally breaking down the doors of our churches, asking us to serve their spiritual needs. There is usually plenty of room in our pews.

But outside the walls, an enormous mission field awaits. Some of those souls are unable to attend regular worship, while others are simply ignorant of their greatest need. Even if they have questions about God, they may not know whom to trust for reliable answers.

So we need to go outside the walls, and chaplaincy is an excellent way to do that. Chaplains seek to bring the comfort of a compassionate, listening heart to hurting souls. So they go to meet people where they are, sometimes in a time of tragedy or great loss, and bring with them a human, caring presence. In some cases, that compassion will open a door to direct—or redirect—a lost sheep to the Good Shepherd.

There are opportunities for chaplaincy in many areas: in hospitals and care facilities, in jails and prisons, in police and fire agencies, on

There are opportunities for chaplaincy in many areas: in hospitals and care facilities, in jails and prisons, in police and fire agencies, on campuses and in locker rooms, at everyday workplaces and at once-in-a-lifetime disasters. campuses and in locker rooms, at everyday workplaces and at oncein-a-lifetime disasters. And if someone is going to be there, don't we want it be someone who can properly apply law and gospel?

Chaplain Certification classes, offered online through Martin



Luther College, demonstrate to public institutions that a chaplain has completed a certain level of spiritual guidance training appropriate to serve those within that institution. Required courses include Communicating Forgiveness, A Spiritual Approach to Addiction Counseling, and Chaplaincy Issues and Fieldwork. Earning a Chaplain Certificate does not, by itself, qualify one for a call into the public ministry, but it surely makes the student more qualified to minister to souls.

Care Committee for Called Workers Keep your staff happy

The Care Committee for Called Workers (CCCW) exists to provide assistance to WELS calling bodies, their called workers, and other staff. Every calling body can benefit from having a committee focused on supporting and encouraging its workers. The CCCW has resources that can help you establish a new care committee or improve one that is already in place.

Calling bodies can support their called workers in several areas:

- **Spiritual support** can involve encouraging personal prayer and Bible study, staff Bible study, and other opportunities for the strengthening and expression of faith.
- **Physical needs** begin when a called worker accepts a call. The new worker may need assistance securing housing, locating doctors, dentists, banks, auto repair shops, etc. Ongoing discussions may involve salary and benefits, vacation policy,

Christian Therapists Network Online course on Scriptural counseling

The WELS/ELS Christian Therapists Network initially focused on finding counselors who are members of our churches. Now the Network is launching an online class for masters-level therapists. "Acting on Hope I: Peace, Comfort, and Hope in Christ Crucified and Arisen" (PSY9501) will be offered through Martin Luther College.

"Acting on Hope I" is the basic course in the Acting on Hope/Bible-Based Counseling Curriculum. As students learn from each other, the teacher, and the textbook, they will develop their own way of using Scripture in counseling sessions that will best honor the Word of God, best help their clients, and that will respect and use evidence-based counseling best practices and methods.

The one-credit course is worth 25 clock hours and lasts for ten weeks. Tuition is \$310. The instructor is Rev. Alan Siggelkow, LCSW, a former parish pastor who taught pastoral counseling at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary for 20 years.

home repair and improvement, tax preparation, and providing support in emergency situations.

- Support for **intellectual needs** means encouraging called workers to continue their education. The calling body is encouraged to subsidize the cost of continuing education, including travel and child care expenses.
- Emotional support includes offering assistance to alleviate stress or deal with workplace conflicts. This is especially important when personal or family counseling may be needed. You can show appreciation by recognizing personal and professional anniversaries with gifts, providing a meal during busy times, arranging child care for an evening out, or inviting the called worker over for dinner.
- **Retirement planning** and investing should be addressed as early as possible in a worker's career. It is important to understand the WELS pension plan, Social Security, and personal investing such as the WELS Shepherd Plan. By using the available tools and resources, each worker can become financially literate and develop a long-term plan for a comfortable retirement. Calling bodies are encouraged to help build their workers' retirement accounts either through matching contributions or a lump sum contribution.

The synodical CCCW serves local committees and workers by producing user-friendly resources, such as a how-to video for starting a local care committee and retirement planning tools.


WELS Foundation exists to help God's people support gospel ministry through WELS. To carry out its mission WELS Foundation provides:

Giving support

CONSULTING SERVICES

WELS Foundation provides planned giving support to WELS members through WELS Christian giving counselors who are specifically trained in both the spiritual and financial aspects of planned giving. The WELS Christian giving counselors coordinate planned giving efforts with other WELS advancement representatives, congregational planned giving committees, or directly with donors and their advisors. Find your local Christian giving counselor at wels.net/christiangivingcounselor.

EDUCATIONAL SEMINARS

WELS Foundation hosts monthly educational webinars. The monthly webinars include timely presentations on various planned giving topics such as Charitable Remainder Trust Essentials, Achieving Donor Goals with Gift Annuities, Working with Donors and Their Advisors, and Making the Right Choice between a Gift Annuity and a Charitable Remainder Trust.

The educational webinars are made available by WELS Foundation at no cost to WELS Christian giving counselors, advancement and development officers, and congregational planned giving committee leaders.

QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION

A qualified charitable distribution allows a donor who is 70.5 or older to give up to \$100,000 directly to WELS charities from an individual retirement account (IRA). The amount distributed will be excluded from income for federal income tax purposes. This may be an especially useful gifting strategy for those who do not itemize their income tax deductions. The IRA distribution must go directly to a qualified charity. You can choose to direct the distribution to WELS Foundation, which in turn will distribute the money to one or more WELS ministries you designate and provide you with the proper acknowledgement. Interested donors will want to contact their WELS Christian giving counselor to find out more.

A gift that pays income for life

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITIES

A charitable gift annuity (CGA) is a contract between a WELS member and WELS Foundation in which the member makes a gift of cash or securities in exchange for fixed annuity payments, generally for life. After the Lord calls him or her home, the remainder of the gift is distributed to the congregation or ministry as designated.

Income payments from a charitable gift annuity may begin immediately, be deferred to a specific date in the future, or be deferred until an unspecified date in the future.

The donor receives an immediate income tax charitable deduction, and in most instances a portion of the gift annuity payments will be a tax-free return of the original principal. Examples of benefits of a \$10,000 charitable gift annuity:

CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUSTS

A charitable remainder trust (CRT) is created when donors transfer cash, securities (stocks, bonds, mutual funds), or real estate into a charitable trust but keep a specified income interest—usually for their life or for a period of years for their children. When the trust ends per the donor's designations, the property in the trust passes to their designated charitable beneficiaries, such as their church and/or synod.

As of June 30, 2017, WELS Foundation administered 162 charitable remainder trusts.

DONOR ADVISED FUNDS

A donor advised fund (DAF) is a charitable giving vehicle wherein an individual, family, or corporation makes an irrevocable, tax-deductible contribution of cash, securities, or other property to WELS Foundation and at any time thereafter can recommend grant distributions to qualified WELS ministries. The fund can be established with current gifts, deferred gifts (such as charitable gift annuities and charitable remainder trusts), and testamentary gifts (such as wills, revocable trusts, or beneficiary designations for life insurance policies or retirement accounts). The WELS Foundation donor advised fund program provides an alternative to the private family foundation. WELS members can accomplish many of the same goals but with far less administrative work and expense.

As of June 30, 2017, WELS Foundation administered 48 donor advised funds.

WELS Funds are designed primarily for the investment needs of endowment funds, scholarship funds, and charitable trust funds that strengthen and enhance our ministry as a whole.

WHO CAN INVEST IN WELS FUNDS?

Any 501(c)(3) organization that is affiliated with WELS (i.e. listed in the WELS Yearbook). (Individuals and organizations located in Connecticut, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, or Virginia may not invest in WELS Funds.)

HOW ARE THE FUNDS MANAGED?

WELS Investment Funds' Board of Directors has retained Vanguard Institutional Advisory Services® as the investment consultant for WELS Investment Funds. As a co-fiduciary, the investment consultant is responsible for making investment recommendations to the board. Once the recommendation is approved by the board, the investment consultant, after consideration of the WELS Investment Funds' investment policy statement and the various investment objectives and restrictions therein, has the discretion to implement and oversee the investment recommendations.

A copy of the most recent investment policy statement is available on the WELS Investment Funds' website.





WHAT IS WELS FUNDS INVESTMENT PHILOSOPHY?

We believe that the earth is the Lord's, and everything in it. From a human perspective, we utilize our knowledge, experience, and available professional resources to provide efficient and effective investment management. Ultimately, we acknowledge that it is the Lord who provides for our needs in the manner that is most beneficial for our individual and collective good.

We believe we can be better stewards by pooling our collective talents and resources. We recognize that each congregation or organization could develop their own investment policies, retain their own consultants, and invest independently in separate portfolios. However, we believe that together we can benefit from the collective knowledge and experience of the membership throughout our synod. Together we can also leverage economies of scale and utilize institutional priced investment opportunities when available.

MANAGEMENT

The Board of Directors of WELS Investment Funds is responsible for the operation of WELS Investment Funds, including the engagement of investment consultants. Directors serve three-year terms and are elected annually by the WELS Synodical Council.

The day-to-day affairs are carried out by its officers and other WELS employees. For administrative convenience, efficiency, and cost effectiveness, WELS Investment Funds leases its personnel from WELS. WELS also provides services relating to the processing of transactions, preparing investor account statements, and the preparation of corporate financial statements.

HOW ARE THE DIRECTORS ON THE WELS INVESTMENT FUNDS' BOARD SELECTED?

Nominations are received from voting members of congregations throughout WELS. The nominees are then vetted by the WELS Human Resources director and the WELS Investment Funds Board of Directors. The Board makes a recommendation to the WELS Synodical Council. The final decision is made by the WELS Synodical Council. The Board of Directors is made up entirely of WELS members with relevant professional experience for service to WELS Investment Funds. The Directors have a heart for ministry and are dedicated to managing WELS Investment Funds to the benefit of invested WELS entities.

WELS members with the necessary skills and experience are encouraged to contact WELS Investment Funds or their pastor to learn more about the nomination process.



The Funds

The WELS Balanced Fund is managed mindful of the longterm investment goals of endowment and scholarship funds. Currently the target allocation for the WELS Balanced Fund is 60% in equity and 40% in fixed income. This target allocation is regularly reviewed by the Board of Directors and is subject to change. Approximately 90% of all investments in the WELS Funds are in the WELS Balanced Fund.

The WELS Equity Fund and WELS Income Funds invest in the same underlying mutual funds as the WELS Balanced Fund. They are available for those organizations who desire an asset allocation other than that offered by the WELS Balanced Fund.

All the mutual funds that comprise the WELS Funds have investment expenses significantly below the industry average. The weighted average expense ratios for the WELS Balanced Fund, WELS Equity Fund, and WELS Income Fund are 0.14%, 0.19%, and 0.06%, respectively.

The WELS Balanced Fund is the portfolio specifically designed for trust, endowment, and scholarship funds within WELS.





OPERATING EXPENSES

All direct expenses and any expenses allocated by WELS related to the operation of WELS Investment Funds (e.g. rent for office space, utilities, financial, technological, and human resources expenses) are charged directly to the WELS Funds. While these expenses vary from year to year, for the fiscal year 2018, they are projected to be approximately 0.21% of the assets in the WELS Funds.

MONTHLY PROCESSING

WELS Funds' transactions are processed on the first business day of each month. Additions and/or redemption requests must be received by WELS Investment Funds at least one business day prior to month end for processing. Funds received prior to month-end will be held in a non-interest bearing cash account until processed. Redemptions proceeds will be deposited in the organization's bank account via direct deposit.

HOW TO INVEST

A custodial account agreement and custodial worksheet must be completed to establish a new account. All investments made pursuant to the custodial agreement will be held in the name of WELS Investment Funds (or such other entity selected by WELS Investment Funds) as nominee for the organization, with actual ownership of the investments remaining in the organization. Each organization investing in the WELS Funds will be assigned an interest (an "Ownership Interest") in the assets of each chosen WELS Fund reflecting the pro rata interest of the organization in the assets of the particular WELS Fund. The value of the organization's Ownership Interest may fluctuate as the value of the particular WELS Fund fluctuates.

CHILD & ADOLESCENT DAY TREATMENT PROGRAM
